

# Applied Folk Linguistics Aila Review

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As applied linguistics is mainly concerned with solving the language-related problems of laypeople, the examination of folk views constitutes an important research field and its relevance is illustrated in this issue of the AILA review.

Issue (24) of the AILA Review was edited by the convenors of the ReN, Antje Wilton & Martin Stegu, and contained contributions by ReN members on a number of topics relating folk linguistic research to applied linguistics. The ReN held a very successful thematic session at the Sociolinguistics Symposium 19 in Berlin in 2012.
