It is very difficult for an Indian or African, subjected to British rule, to adopt manners or cultural values from the British without in some sense suppressing his or her own way of being.

In hybridity, 'the sense of mimicry' breaks down the strict polarization of imperialism. Further they regard hybridity as the trans-cultural phenomenon of the colonizer and the colonized culture but the celebration of hybridity is referred to the establishing of colonized culture (cited in Ferdous).
