His daughter, Elizabeth I, accomplished the English conquest of the island. In the early seventeenth century the English government began a policy of colonization by importing English and Scottish

immigrants, a policy that often necessitated the forcible removal of the native Irish.

What was intended to happen was that the Gaelic upper classes would become loyal subjects, abandon their 'barbarous' Irish ways, and

gradually become assimilated into the English aristocracy. The analysis behind this policy was that Ireland's chronic violence was caused by the permanent quartering of mercenaries by local lords (known as "bonnacht" to the Irish and "coign and livery")
